You Gave Her Hope

On a freezing cold day in January, a sweet boxer was found in a family's barn and brought to the shelter. Covered in infected wounds and horribly emaciated at just 34 pounds, she was so weak she was unable to stand.

The shelter staff gave her the name Hope because, at that point, hope was all she had going for her.

That's true for so many of the animals that come to the shelter. Whether they are injured, sick, or just homeless, what they need the most is hope. That's what you been give them.

Hope's journey wasn't easy. Initial tests showed that she had an enlarged heart, a heart murmur, and a BB shot lodged in her leg. She went to foster care with an employee, Stephanie, where she spent two weeks receiving high doses of antibiotics and pain medication. Her wounds were cleaned twice daily and she ate five times a day. But Stephanie said from the first day, Hope was happy...and she's been happy ever since.

Stephanie and her husband decided to adopt Hope into their family. She now lives with them and their dogs and cats. She's put on weight and her wounds have healed. Best of all, she's learning what it's like to have family. She climbs into bed for cuddles and she's learned about toys for the first time, and now carries one with her wherever she goes. She's finally safe. She has a new name, too...Abby.

Thanks to you, she no longer needs Hope.





Getting There is Half the Fun

Driving through Brown County in the spring, you may not notice all of the narrow gravel roads and steep hills that make up a large part of the county. Come winter, though, when the leaves are off the trees, you start to see just how many houses there are hidden off the main roads. It's down those roads and up those hills that you'll see our Serving Pets Outreach Team (SPOT) van travelling, as the team meets with county residents to tell them about our programs or delivers pet food and supplies for those in need.



In 2016, 220 field visits were made, delivering more than 21,000 pounds of pet food, 54 bales of straw, collars, leashes, dog houses, runner lines, and feral traps. Those roads put a lot of wear and tear on a vehicle and, after many years of service, our SPOT van finally gave up. Rusted through in so many places that pavement was visible through gaps in the floor, it was no longer safe to drive.

Thankfully, through grants from several organizations, (the Petco Foundation, the Brown County Community Foundation, South Central Indiana REMC, and Howard F. Hughes Legacy Passthrough Fund), we'll soon be able to purchase a new van, one that can handle the workload as well as provide safe transportation for our volunteers.

An Opportunity for Double the Impact

In May, we held our annual Phone-a-Thon, this year raising money for the SPOT fund. Donors have so far contributed a generous \$23,000. However, with matching funds provided by the Tony Stewart Foundation, the Werling Charitable Foundation, the Tompkins Foundation for FeLV Advocacy, and the Howard F. Hughes Legacy Passthrough Fund, we have the opportunity to match up to \$33,000. That's \$10,000 of added matching funds you can help us receive if you contribute before June 30th.

This funding comes at an especially critical moment. As we celebrate a major milestone—5,000 pets altered since the inception of the SPOT program—the only veterinarian in our community is no longer performing surgeries. As a result, we've seen a 60% increase in requests for spay/neuter services in the first four months of 2017. Your support here will have more of an impact than ever in reducing the population of unwanted animals.

Dawg Gone Walk & Fiesta

Despite a brief downpour in the morning, May 21 turned into a beautiful day for a dog walk. With plenty of games and contests, shopping and socializing, it was an opportunity to celebrate the joy that dogs bring to our lives and to raise over \$25,000 for the animals at the shelter.
