with a save rate of 30%, this organization has proven that a LITTLE shelter can achieve BIG results.

Since 2010, we have consistently achieved an amazing save rate of over 95% compared to the national average of 60%.

Our proactive spay/neuter program has been an important component in helping us achieve this level of success by helping to control pet over-population and greatly reducing unwanted litters in our county.

Other programs that have been important to our success are the partnerships we have formed with rescue groups, transports, foster families and off-site adoptions.

None of this success would be possible without the strength of many passionate and caring people who contribute their time and resources to our efforts.
