




11am Our vet tech does rounds to check on everyone and give meds to the sick animals. We saw over 88 cases of medical needs in 2017.




**Gam** Never fear....the cats are sure to get their attention as well! Last year we cared for 376 cats. That is a lot of cute kitty rubs to be had.


