# Despite challenges, adapting to change creates great results

2020 has been a year of constant change and uncertainty. We have spent the year making many adjustments to the look of daily business. The shelter went from normal business hours to operating by-appointment only. Staffing levels were reduced. Meetings went from being in-person to all via phone conference. But, through everything, operations kept going and lives were saved.

We learned so much – about ourselves and about our supportive community. These challenges forced us to think outside of our box, become more efficient and discover new ways of doing things. And, in the end we (staff, volunteers and supporters) have come out the other side stronger than ever before. And, we have so many successes to celebrate so far.

Two dogs, Moby and Merlin, who had been in the shelter for over 2 years found their forever homes because of families who had time to get to know them before adopting. Senior kitty, Nacho Momma, who had been with us over six months found her home thanks to the loyal supporters who shared her story on social media. Additionally, other animals who had the potential to be long-stay animals, found their perfect fits quickly due to families being at

home and willing to give them a chance.

Thanks to a caring community willing to open their homes and hearts up to adoption, we have been able to import over 100 cats

and dogs from struggling shelters both regionally and nationally. Most recently, we imported dogs at-risk of euthanasia from Tennessee and brought in dogs who were left homeless after Hurricane Sally. Many of these imported dogs and cats were adopted within days of arriving at our shelter.

With so many of us spending more time at home, a record number of people contacted us with an interest in fostering animals. Families who had never fostered before were willing to give it a try. Nearly 20 new families have provided foster care for our animals this year and that number continues to grow. Additionally, with the lack of spay/neuter earlier in the year we had to explore the option allowing people to foster the pet they wanted to adopt until it could be sterilized and then adopted. This allowed dogs and cats to spend time in a loving home, while waiting for their surgery instead of staying alone in the shelter.

We won't say the year has been easy. But, because of the strength of our organization and the dedication of our supporters, we have made it through and will continue to save lives. Thank you for believing in our mission and allowing us to live up to our motto of **Little Shelter Big Results.**



From strip of grass to framed building

In the June Paw Prints newsletter, ground had just been broken on the new animal shelter and site prep was barely underway. Now, just four months later the progress of this project is astonishing.

The foundation has been poured, walls have been erected, trusses have been



BCHS board members meet regularly with the general contractor, Strauser Construction, to review progress and receive plans for the coming weeks. Recently, the project architect inspected the progress and was delighted with the top-notch quality and speed of the work. We are thrilled with the service provided by both the architectural firm, Shelter Planners of America, and the general contractor.

Progress is on track to have all windows, doors and exterior fittings in place before winter. This will allow for work to continue regardless of the weather. Estimated completion for the new shelter is late Spring 2021.

Generous donors made this structure possible. And, now the community's support is needed to help transform this house into a home. Making the building a home will provide a healthier, safer environment as well as a more comfortable and welcoming facility for both the animals and visitors.

# Barn Sale sets record in funds received during difficult year



Going into this year's Barn Sale event there was a lot of uncertainty because of the impact of COVID-19 on our lives. First, would people donate? Well, after being completely blown away by the volume of donations on the first day, that question quickly switched to can enough volunteers be found to price all of this? And, more importantly, will people come back to shop?

And, luckily the answer to both of those questions was a big **YES**.

Due to construction at the shelter, the event was moved to

the Olde Time Flea Market and it ended up being a blessing in disguise. Generous donors provided more items for this year's sale than has ever been received. So many items in fact, that had the event been at the Barn, there would have been no way to house everything received.

Next, over 50 volunteers provided 1,700 hours of labor to make this event possible. Many of these hours were completed in just a 10-day period leading up to the event. The days were long, hot and grueling, but this group of amazing individuals came together and had everything ready to go for opening day.

Finally, the community came together once again to support this great cause and we had a line of shoppers waiting to enter on the first day of the sale. And, man did they shop. In total, this year's Barn Sale event raised over \$46,000 in just three days! A record for the sale and a much-needed influx of funds to the shelter.




