

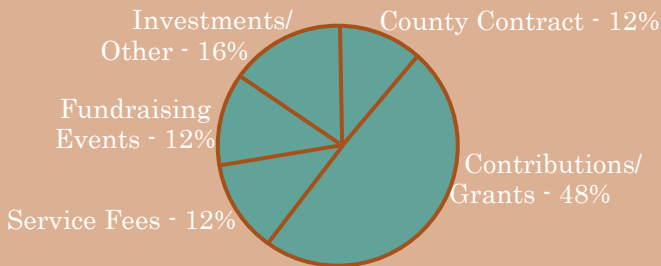


2020 Annual Report

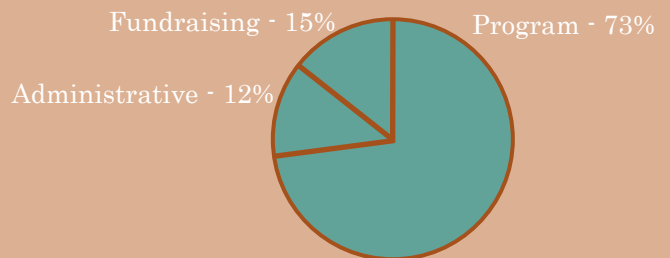

How we worked together to save lives in 2020



Nearly 150 dogs and cats at risk of euthanasia at other shelters were imported and quickly found homes



Despite spay/neuter clinics being closed for months, we adapted quickly and pets were sterilized as soon as possible



An appointment-only system was created to limit people in the facility and keep the staff safe. Adoptions boomed!



Dog walk volunteers spent 7,600 hours exercising the dogs, reducing their stress and creating happier, healthier pups



Met the \$3.2 million goal for the new shelter, broke ground and expect to open in late Spring 2021



Over 180 kittens and puppies began their lives in foster care until becoming strong enough to be adopted to their loving homes
