

Before Adopting a New Pet, Consider if They Are The Right Fit

Shelters around the country, including ours, are seeing an increase in population and the length of time an animal waits to be adopted. There is nothing more exciting than the day that a long-stay pet finally gets the forever home it so greatly deserves! But, sometimes what we hope is a happy ending doesn't work out.

Time and again we see pets returned to the shelter because they were not the right fit for that particular home. Many of us are drawn to the dogs or cats that we think are the cutest, but when deciding which furry companion to take home, there are a lot of factors to consider in making sure that you have a pet that is a good fit for you and your lifestyle.

Temperament

Just as we have individual personalities, pets have their own personalities as well. Some temperaments you might find endearing, others might not be a good fit. If you like a lot of quiet time, then a high energy dog or cat may not be the best fit.

Exercise/Activity

Pets require different amounts of exercise. Some dogs only require one walk a day, while others may need several, in addition to plenty of outdoor space to run around. If you hike or run regularly, then a high energy pet may be a great fit. Kittens need plenty of activity and play, sometimes in the middle of the night. If you prefer more leisurely activities or have health issues that make it difficult to move, then a lower energy dog or cat may be a better fit.

Housing

Even apartment complexes that allow pets may have breed restrictions and weight limitations. If you know you may be moving, you may want to consider a pet that would meet the requirements for most living places. Housing problems are one of the biggest reasons pets are surrendered to shelters.

Time / Attention

If you are a person who spends long days at the office or travels frequently, you may need to employ a pet sitter or dog walker. If you have the time and interest for training, then a puppy or a pet requiring some TLC may work well. If not, then you might want to consider a pet that is already well-trained or understands basic commands.

If you have questions about what pet would be a good fit for you, don't hesitate to ask the humane society staff. They get to know the animals well and can help you determine who could end up being your lifetime companion.



If you are looking for a calmer pet, an older dog like Margo (*above*) may be the right fit. If you would like to add some energy to your home, a younger pet like Rosie or Leo (*below*) may be better.

SPOT Clinic Provides Vaccines to Keep Community Pets Healthy

Our annual SPOT Rabies Vaccination Clinic was held on Sunday,



April 28th. The Clinic served 494 dogs and cats from nearly 200 families received services during the three-hour event. "It is a great feeling to know that this clinic allows local pets to get the basic vaccinations they need," said BCHS board president Sue Ann Werling.



Additionally, 106 pets were microchipped during the clinic, which means their likelihood of reuniting with their families should they ever get lost is now much higher!

SPOT Continues Making Difference for Community Pets

In 2024, the Serving Pets Outreach Team (SPOT) will be celebrating 15 years of serving the community pets of Brown County. This year, the program will also spay/neuter its 10,000th pet since its inception. The impact of this program is huge and has easily prevented the birth of nearly 100,000 unwanted pets. Without SPOT, our community would look very different today.

In addition to spay/neuter services, SPOT provided over 17,000 pounds of food assistance last year. A bag of food can mean the difference between a loved pet remaining in its home or being surrendered to the shelter. And, it looks like this year will be one of the biggest in terms of demand for this much-needed service.

The SPOT food assistance program relies solely on donations. If you would like to support this program, donations of dry dog food are needed now. **We are completely out and cannot meet the demand of those in need.** Any brand of food can be accepted.
