With her soulful eyes, quiet strength, and unwavering spirit, she became a fixture at the shelter—one of those animals who touched countless lives.

On March 11, 2025, that long chapter came to a beautiful close—and a brand new one began. Her new dad spent nearly a week patiently getting to know her, building trust day by day until she felt safe. Their bond grew quickly and deeply.

On her adoption day, she celebrated in style: a scenic hike to stretch her legs and soak in the fresh air, a well-deserved ice cream treat to mark the moment, and a peaceful night's sleep on her very own twin-sized mattress. For the first time in a long time, Inga slept not as a shelter dog, but as a cherished family member.

Community Grants Help Both Shelter Pets and Our Community

We're excited to share that generous grants from the Smithville Foundation and Brown County Community Foundation (BCCF) are helping us care for both shelter pets and pets in the community.

Thanks to the Smithville Foundation, we've installed a brand-new shade sail in our dog play yard! This much-needed upgrade keeps our pups (and volunteers) cooler while they enjoy the outdoors. It also creates a more comfortable space for adopters to meet dogs in a relaxed, shaded environment—just in time for summer.

The BCCF awarded funds to help us purchase pet food for a new initiative through our Serving Pets Outreach Team (SPOT) to distribute pet food at existing food pantries. SPOT distributed over 21,000 pounds of food last year to Brown County families, and with growing demand, this support ensures more pets can stay in their homes during tough times.

We're deeply grateful to both foundations for supporting our mission and helping us keep animals safe, healthy, and loved—whether they're in the shelter or already home.



Annual Vaccination Clinic Serves Record Number of Pets

On Sunday, April 27, our SPOT program held its largest Rabies Vaccination Clinic yet, serving over 500 pets and their families! Thanks to perfect weather and a great turnout, 535 dogs and cats received vaccines, and 69 pets got microchipped—a simple step that can help reunite lost pets with their families.

We send a huge thanks to the Brown County Music Center for hosting, and to BC Emergency Management for setting up a safe space for our feline friends. We could not have pulled off such a successful day without the hard work and heart of over 40 volunteers.

To our amazing veterinarians — Drs. Baker, Finney, Funk, and Sheckell — we are deeply thankful for your help to keep our community's pets healthy.

And thank you to every pet owner who came out and waited patiently. What a day!



Pet Food Pantry Launch

In partnership with three local food pantries, our amazing SPOT volunteers are now distributing pet food to families in need. This program, supported by a \$1,000 grant from the Brown County Community Foundation, has already provided over 2,300 pounds of food!

Heartworm on the Rise

We usually see fewer than five heartworm cases a year—but we've already hit that number in just four months. Treatment is long and stressful for the dogs, but preventable with regular medication. Please keep your pets protected—and help spread the word!
